Other Worlds/Fantasy/Dystopia


Scroll through the list to view a few of the titles suggested by our Librarians here in school for your year group.

When her half-brothers are born critically ill, Jess becomes convinced that their survival depends on what's happening to the flask...

Through Jess's stunning narration, Nicky Singer explores the meaning of life, and the interconnected nature of all things – in a way which is entirely accessible to young readers.




Cherry Heaven by L J Adlington

A tense, engrossing mystery, exploring post-war guilt and punishment, redemption and reconciliation.




Knife/Swift by RJ Anderson

Abandon by Meg Cabot






The Mortal Instruments series




Breathe by Sarah Crossan

With Jenna refusing to face the truth, Morveren finds herself alone at the worst possible time. Because when the worlds of Air and Mer meet, the consequences can be terrible.


All the books are beautifully written and are an exciting adventure.

The Beautiful Creatures (series)






Maggot Moon by Sally Gardner

MAGGOT MOON is an unforgettable story of courage, friendship and rebellion, written in a wholly original style that will have readers on the edge of their seats from beginning to end.




His Dark Materials (trilogy)






Divergent/Insurgent by Veronica Roth

The Lord of the Rings (trilogy)

Continuing the story begun in *The Hobbit*, all three parts of the epic masterpiece, *The Lord of the Rings*, in one paperback. Features the definitive edition of the text, fold-out flaps with the original two-colour maps, and a revised and expanded index. Sauron, the Dark Lord, has gathered to him all the Rings of Power - the means by which he intends to rule Middle-earth. All he lacks in his plans for dominion is the One Ring - the ring that rules them all - which has fallen into the hands of the hobbit, Bilbo Baggins. In a sleepy village in the Shire, young Frodo Baggins finds himself faced with an immense task, as the Ring is entrusted to his care. He must leave his home and make a perilous journey across the realms of Middle-earth to the Crack of Doom, deep inside the territories of the Dark Lord. There he must destroy the Ring forever and foil the Dark Lord in his evil purpose. Since it was first published in 1954, *The Lord of the Rings* has been a book people have treasured. Steeped in unrivalled magic and otherworldliness, its sweeping fantasy has touched the hearts of young and old alike.
