

The clue is in the title...




There is No Dog by Meg Rosoff




Geekhood – Close Encounters of the Girl Kind by Andy Robb


Tom Gates Series by Liz Pichon






Murder and Chips

The Wimpey Kid Diaries




Unhooking the Moon




A Dog Called Grk by Joshua Doder


Together he and Grk will have to break into a high-security prison, pilot a helicopter, and make a nail-biting run for the border in this high-octane, international adventure.




You Have to Stop This
