Strawberry Smoothie Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1 large banana.
- 250g strawberries, halved.
- 250g raspberries.
- 50 ml apple juice.

Equipment:

- Blender.
- Sharp kitchen knife.
- Chopping board.
- Glass.
- Straw.



1. Firstly, wash, de-stalk and halve your strawberries and put them into a blender.
2. Then, chop up the banana into small discs and also place into the blender.
3. Afterwards, wash the raspberries and place into the blender.

4. Fourthly, blend the fruit together and then add the juice. You can use as much as you want depending on how thick you want your smoothie to be.

5. Lastly, once you have the smoothie to your preferred taste, pour into a glass and enjoy. This recipe makes about 3 to 4 servings.

For a little added twist, I cut a left over strawberry almost in half and left the stalk on to create a fun feature on the glass.

Agent Garbo: The Expert Liar

Have you ever wondered how a poor Spanish poultry farmer became a leading British and German spy who managed to help turn the tides of the war and lead the Allies to a victory on D-Day? Probably not, but I'll tell you the story anyways.

Juan Pujol García had failed at almost everything he had ever tried to do, including being a student, soldier and a businessman, but when war broke out in Europe, Pujol saw an opportunity to do something more useful with his life than being a chicken farmer.

Unfortunately, his plan hit a few snags at the get-go. When Pujol went to the British embassy in Spain, he was told firmly to go away several times. He then decided that he would take this task into his own hands, so he offered to spy for the Germans, who accepted his offer and told Pujol to go to London, code naming him 'Agent Arabel'.

Going to Lisbon instead of London, Pujol drew up fictitious stories about England that sometimes struck close to the truth. MI6 back in England was very confused about who this

was as it played on their fears of a spy within their ranks. After months and months of searching, MI6 finally found out about Pujol. They then contacted him and brought him to London. In doing so, the allies gained a completely loyal double agent, already trusted by the Germans, who was able to help turn the tide of the war.

One of the outright lies Pujol, now codenamed 'Agent Garbo' by the British, had told the Germans was that he had also recruited sub-agents who worked through him for the German cause. By April 1942, he and his MI6 partner, Thomás Harris, had created 27 of these sub-agents, sending 315 letters to German high command over the course of the war. These sub-agents each had his own unique writing style, and were able to send some accurate, but irrelevant

information, with the help of MI6. Garbo's ever-expanding of fictitious informants was completely absurd. For example he had apparently recruited a small Welsh group of strong anti-Semitic people who wanted to overthrow the government through assassination to bring about national socialism, like Nazis. They were called "The Brothers in the Aryan World Order". Garbo said that only of these 'brothers' and a 'sister' joined the network along with leader's girlfriend who only spoke Hindi. Under any normal (or sane) circumstances, it is likely that these tall tales would not be believed. Ironically, due to the sheer amount of information Germans did not see the need to send many other spies to England. Leading up to D-Day, it was told the Germans that the upcoming Allied attack would be at the Pas de Calais, the most obvious choice for attacking German-occupied France, which the real attack would be in Normandy. As the Allied soldiers left England heading for Normandy in the early hours of the morning on June 6, 1944 Garbo informed his German contacts that this was merely a faint and that the real attack would still be at



HOW TO LEARN KOREAN!

Learning a new language is not an easy task. Especially if you are already studying more than one! However, you should not dismiss the idea because there are so many benefits to being able to communicate in languages other than your own, and if you are committed to learning then there is nothing to stop you becoming fluent over time!

After taking French and Spanish for two of my A-Level options, I soon found that any worries I had about confusing the two seemed to disappear after the first few weeks – after I remembered that not all languages have upside down question marks at the beginning of a question and that the Spanish word for yes was definitely not ‘oui’ – simply because the level that we learn at really highlights the differences between the two. It was after noticing this, and allowing myself to have more confidence with what I was saying/writing, I thought that there was no reason why I couldn’t pick up and learn another language on the side. So I chose Korean!

I started off by looking online at the best methods for learning a new language, specifically one with a completely different alphabet to the Roman (Latin) alphabet which is the most commonly used across the world. I found a website which recommended starting off by getting a textbook so that you can master the characters and their corresponding sounds. The book which I am working through is called ‘Korean Made Simple’ by ‘Billy Go’ and I cannot recommend it enough! The first chapters focus on learning the alphabet and the pronunciation, and as you progress through you are introduced to verbs and also cultural facts as well so that you get a real sense of not just the language but also the lifestyle.

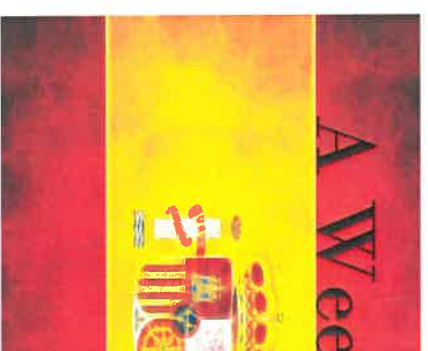
